HELP! Your u3a needs **YOU**: Croydon u3a is proud to provide 70 groups for our members to enjoy. However we are the victims of our own success - as our membership grows, our groups are becoming full. On a sunny July day a group from **Looking at London group** visited the wonderful Dorich House Museum, a little known treasure, hidden from the road, on Kingston Vale and overlooking Richmond Park.

The house was designed and built by Dora Gordine and her husband Richard Hare as a studio-home. Dora (1895-1991) was a sculptor, artist and designer of great renown until knowledge of her faded after she stopped working in the late 1970s due to failing eyesight and arthritis.

Richard, the Hon Richard Hare (1907-1966), was an aristocrat, diplomat, academic and art collector.

Dora designed the house to be a home for her and Richard, but also to be a working place with an exhibition space for herself. Unfortunately, by the time of Dora's death it had fallen into disrepair so when in 1994 Dorich House was gifted to Kingston University a huge renovation project was undertaken and in 2004 it was opened to the public as a museum.

The house is on three floors, with the addition of a roof terrace. The ground floor originally had many rooms including a garage, cloakroom, laundry room, maid's room and large studio for Dora's clay work. The first and second floors are much as they were when Dora and Richard lived there, with the first floor having a large modelling studio and an exhibition gallery, and the top floor being their living quarters.

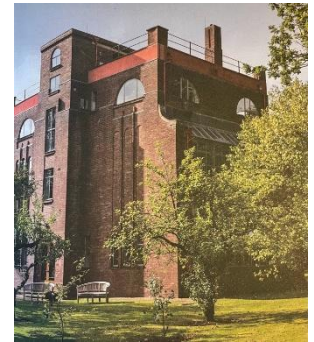
The ground floor studio is now a café and that was our first stop.

The first floor studio has some examples of Dora's work including *Seated Baby* (1937-38) which was commissioned for Westminster Council's Maternity and Child Welfare Centre in Pimlico. She was also commissioned to do a large bronze statue, *Mother and Child* (1963) for the Surrey branch of the Royal Marsden Hospital, which can still be seen outside the main reception area. There are many more of her bronzes on display in the gallery.

The semi-circular windows you can see from outside the house are stunning from inside and are reflected in the sliding doors that connect the dining and sitting rooms. On this level you can sit on the chairs and sofas, and we were lucky enough to be asked to sit down at the dining table. The backs of the chairs were sprung so when you leaned back they gave slightly – so comfortable.

Richard was a great collector of Imperial Russian art and parts of his collection are displayed in the two rooms that were bedrooms.

I only discovered Dorich House a year ago, but since then I have taken many friends there, and they, in turn, have taken friends. If you are tempted to visit, be sure to watch the 20 minute video in the first floor studio. Also, be warned that it is only open Thursday to Saturday and is closed through August. This is because it is run by volunteers from Kingston University.

Members of Croydon u3a's **Local History group** were delighted to be invited to help with Shirley Community Library's Local History project.

As you may know, the Library was saved from closure, with the non-profit Community organisation *Play Place Innov8 CIC* taking on its management under a long-term lease. *Play Place* is working closely with residents, volunteers, and community groups and the Library now hosts a wide variety of different activities as well as still providing a library service.

The Library holds several files of archival resources which badly need indexing and sorting - a project which was taken on by volunteer Dawn Gibbons. Herself a member of Croydon u3a, Dawn turned to us for help, as well as inviting other members of the community to get involved. Work has now begun on sorting out the files and as you can see in the photos, the project is proving engaging and interesting.



Dawn writes: 'If there are any u3a members who have any items to donate to the library archives about Shirley we would be happy to accept them'. She adds that they would also be welcome '...if they just want to visit to view the library archives and find out about other facilities at the library'.

12 members of **History of London group 4** visited the Guildhall Library, which last year celebrated 600 years since it was first founded with a bequest from Richard Whittington. The Library has a display case exhibition about its history from the original collection of largely religious books, kept on chains to prevent losses, to the current public library with its specialist collections about London's history, the Livery Companies and Marine and Stock Market records.

In addition to the display, Senior Librarian, Melanie Strong, gave us a presentation on the collections and arranged for us to see some of the Library Treasures. Sadly the chains did not prevent the City losing almost all of the original collection when it was "borrowed" and not returned by William Cecil, Lord Burghley. Edward Seymour, 1st Duke of Somerset and Lord Protector of England is blamed for the loss on John Stow's Survey of London though that is now thought to be inaccurate.

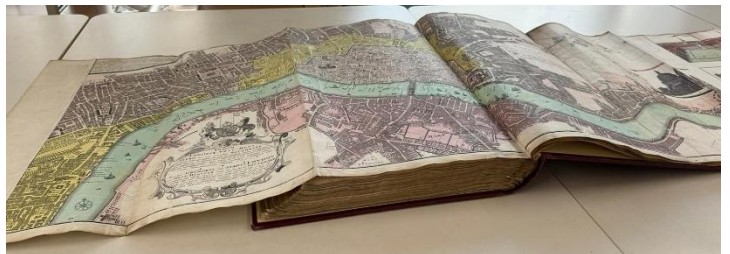


From the early Library, Melanie drew our attention to an original book still with its chain, a book with sections of the Bible rephrased in rhyming couplets, copies of the Nuremberg Chronicle (printed with over 1,800 woodcuts in 1493). Melanie had two copies of the Nuremberg Chronical available - one plain, another with its illustrations hand tinted. The Library has three, two in Latin and one in German. Melanie pointed out that the contents were a mix of the Bible - the Chronicle starts at Genesis - Greek and Roman history and events of medieval Germany. All shown in the contemporary world of 15th century Europe.

Melanie also showed us the Library's copy of the Third Folio of Shakespeare's plays. Printed in 1664 most copies of this book were lost in the Great Fire. It includes seven extra plays, six now thought to

be not Shakespeare's but, its speculated, added to revive sales. We also saw Library's copy of the collected Works of Geoffrey Chaucer printed in 1561, John Stow's Survey of London, which includes the story of Edward Somerset's "borrowing" the first collection, records of the Brewer's Company and an eighteenth century foldout illustrated map of London.

Melanie had also brought out the records of a walking group of British Telecom engineers. The group had initially set out to trace a pilgrimage to Canterbury and had then carried on walking together for about forty years. Two group members had decided to create an illustrated manuscript style record of the walks. One wrote the text and the other learned calligraphy and produced eight volumes which are stunningly beautiful.



Our thanks go to the Library staff for the extra help they gave to us and we recommend visiting the exhibition.

On a hot July afternoon, the **Local History group** met in the very pleasantly cool interior of **Croydon Minster** for a talk and guided tour by the church historian, David Morgan.

Many of us will know of David through the weekly articles he writes for *Inside Croydon* on the history of the Minster and people connected to it. As the Local History group is currently researching the story of



Croydon as a commercial centre, he was able to tell us about the prominent role played by the Minster and various Archbishops of Canterbury in developing Croydon as an important Market Town.

The medieval church was destroyed by fire in 1867 - we saw the copy of a contemporary picture of the tragedy. The group is shown listening to David in the South porch, one of the very few remnants of the old church which survived the fire. Other survivals are Archbishop Whitgift's tomb and a very rare 15th century eagle lectern in which tithes ('Peter's Pence') were collected - being placed in its beak and falling down into the hollow interior.

On a beautiful summer's day in July, 18 members of the **Transport Group** ventured out on a trip along part of the Regent's Canal, from Camden Lock to Little Venice and back again.

With an excellent guide, we learned about the history of canals from their beginning at the end of the 18th century when they provided the main way of moving goods across the country - to their decline after the railways came along and offered a faster service.

We boarded our boat, *The Jenny Wren*, at Camden Lock - built between 1818 and 1820 - and journeyed along the canal past Regent's park and the zoo, enjoying the sight of beautiful gardens, enormous houses - including one where the Obamas stayed - and colourful and often quirky house boats until we came to picturesque Little Venice, where the Grand Union and Regent's canals meet.



We learned how locks work, how horse-drawn boats had to be powered through tunnels where horses couldn't go by two men lying on deck and using their legs to push against the tunnel walls (*legging it*). Our knowledgeable guide was full of information and amusing tales - such as how, when the new-fangled steam trains were competing for business with the canals, the naughty train drivers, when on a bridge crossing the canal, would blow their whistles as a barge came through - scaring the horses so that they jumped into the river. Special ramps had to be built for the horses to clamber out of the canal - which is fortunately only a few feet

deep! We heard too how Gilbey's gin cancelled their contract with the canal boats when they discovered that the bargees were quaffing the gin and topping up the levels in the bottles with water from the canal!

In true Croydon u3a style - we all learned something new - while having a really good day out!

MICROGREENS WORKSHOP

Only a few places left

Microgreens are the young seedlings of leafy vegetables and herbs and are classed as superfoods because they are bursting with nutrients. Rich in polyphenols and antioxidant properties they can help boost overall health.

We have booked the owners of Hamsey Greens Micro Farm to run a workshop for us on **Saturday 26th September 10am – 1 pm at Shirley Methodist Church, Eldon Avenue, CRO 8SD. The cost is £16.**

You will learn about the different microgreens, how to plant and harvest them. You will take away a planting tray with organic compost and a packet of seeds to start you off. Chris & Al Shervington established their locally based company during covid. They sell all the necessary equipment, attend Wallington Farmer's Market every month and run a free or £1 delivery service. Their seeds are all organic and they also have a great selection of home smoked cheeses. Refreshments are included.

Do you need help with your hearing?

Would you like to be part of a research project with Nottingham University?

We have been contacted by some researchers at Nottingham University about a research project they are running. They are inviting us to be part of the online study to help people who find it hard to follow conversations in noisy settings or have difficulty hearing conversations.

Evidence has shown that listening and thinking games can help by training the brain to listen better. The main goal of these games is to improve everyday listening.

In these games, people practise listening and responding to speech. For example, listening for specific words in sentences and selecting them from a list.

In this study, they will be testing two new games in the 'PLUS' program. PLUS stands for Practice Listening and Understanding Speech. The PLUS listening and thinking games were developed with people who experience listening difficulties due to hearing loss.

You are eligible to take part in this study if you:

-  Are 18 years of age or over
-  Have a good understanding of written and spoken English
-  Have internet access at home
-  Have a computer, laptop, or tablet that can play sound

What will you be asked to do?

Section One (approx. 1 hour)

Has some initial assessments of your hearing now and asks about your demographic details.

Section Two

You will then:

1. Be asked to provide your email address.
2. Receive an email with your PLUS training login and an instruction booklet so you can start the program right away.
3. Asked to train online for 30 minutes a day, for about 5 days a week, over the next 2 weeks or so.

Section Three

After playing the PLUS games for 2 weeks, you will get a link by email to complete a final set of assessments to see how your hearing has changed.

Once you finish the final assessments, you will have the opportunity to enter a prize draw for the chance to win a shopping voucher worth between £10 and £150. The odds of winning a voucher are about 1 in 2. If you choose to enter and are selected to win, you will be notified and will receive the voucher electronically via email. Each participant may win a maximum of one voucher.

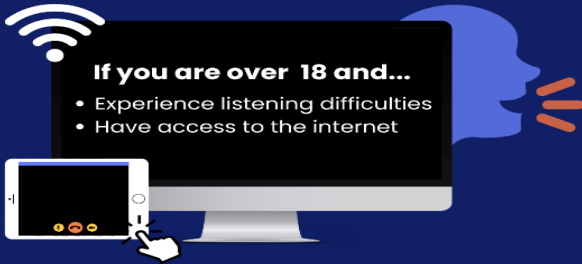
The research team cannot promise that taking part will help you directly. But the information from this study will help them make tools that provide the greatest possible benefit to patients in the future.

This is an opportunity for any u3a members or their friends or family members who have hearing problems to be part of a proper research project that may help us and people in the future with hearing issues.

For more details, contact u3a Committee Member Joy Ellery (joyellery@btinternet.com, 07710 244601) who can explain more about the project and put you in contact with the researchers directly so that you can speak to them before you decide if you want to start the project. The project is running until December, so you don't have to start right away.



Do you find it hard to follow speech in noisy settings or take part in conversations?



If you are over 18 and...

- Experience listening difficulties
- Have access to the internet

We invite you to be part of an online study. The study aims to improve two new listening and thinking games for people with hearing loss.

Look after your Freedom Pass!

While on the way home from a day out, a Croydon u3a member recently found that his Freedom Pass had stopped working. Luckily, he was able to complete his journey by showing the card to staff at the barriers,

He later discovered that the card had a crack in it - it had been sitting in his pocket next to a steel water bottle and he feels it was probably damaged by being crushed between that and the arm-rest of the seat he sat in on the train.



When he wanted to replace the card, he discovered that **cards that are lost or damaged cost £15 to replace**. They are only replaced free of charge if they stop working **but are undamaged** - or if they have been stolen - thefts must be reported to the police and you will need to obtain a crime reference number.

This tells us that even the slightest split or bend can affect the aerial and chip running through the card. If it looks OK but does not work, you must send it away for inspection - and will still have to pay £15. This will be refunded if it is deemed to be faulty.

The passes are quite thin - thinner than credit cards. **So please do take care of these precious pieces of plastic**, which we all rely on to get out and about - and be careful how you store them in your purse or pocket!

Creating a Community Garden in Croydon

We were delighted to read recently an article in Inside Croydon about how Croydon u3 member Charles Barber is involved with creating a Community Garden in Selhurst. We asked him to write about the project and his article follows.

We know that many Croydon u3a members volunteer with community projects and would be very pleased to hear from you about these.

“When I first discovered my local park, Whitehorse Road Recreation Ground in Selhurst, I was both disappointed and very underwhelmed. The garden clearly received minimal maintenance from our ever cash-strapped Council with its grass cut occasionally and all the shrubs pruned to a standard 1 metre height once a year in the spring. As someone who had spent most of my working life, trying to make customers’ gardens more beautiful and wildlife friendly, this seemed like a scandalous waste of space. Surely with a bit of care and hard work, it could be turned into a Community Garden for both people and wildlife to enjoy.



In 2015, Croydon had a free monthly magazine called The Croydon Citizen to which wannabe, amateur journalists such as myself were allowed to submit articles. I wrote an article about the neglected garden and then I and three friends set up *The Friends of White Horse Park* to try and improve it.



Sadly, those three friends have now moved away from Croydon, but Tracy, Rose and Catherine have now joined me on the committee and together we are attempting to create a relaxing, beautiful haven for humans and a useful larder for pollinating insects. We also organise a monthly litter-pick on the last Saturday of each month. Having worked as a solo gardener for most of my adult life, it has been a joy and education to work as part of a team, but we could do so much more if we had more volunteers. We have plans to grow more drought resistant plants and a variety of herbs around the garden. **If any u3a members would like to know more, or maybe even get their**

Creative Croydon u3a – Shirley Shephard

I was asked to be a judge for this year's competition which was a pleasure, seeing so many talented artists' work but it was hard to make a decision. Luckily, there were several judges and decisions were soon made. I am looking forward to seeing the new banners up later in the year.

There is clearly a lot of creativity in Croydon and I'm very pleased that it is being acknowledged and highlighted”.

Your booking may be jeopardised if this is not done. If you request more than one place, we must have the first name and surname and u3a number of each person.
